

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

- 5. To introduce innovative programmes that will significantly contribute to the prosperity of the region.

These things are transmitted /communicated to the students, staff, teachers and other stakeholders by way of Prospectus, College website and displaying on the boards at prominent places within the College Campus on regular basis.

6.2 Does the Institution has a Management Information System

Yes, the college has a Management Information System (MIS).

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Curricula are designed and developed at the University level, so the scope of Innovative curricular designing is limited. The college follows and implements the syllabus as it is. However, HODs of the affiliating colleges are members of the Board of Studies in their respective subjects. The suggestion of the college teachers are also considered while preparing the curricula.

The heads of various departments of the College are actively participated in designing the curriculum, its development and revision process in the board of studies meetings conducted at University of Jammu. Choice Based Credit System has been introduced from the current session at the undergraduate level.

- Academic calendar of the College is prepared at the beginning of the session.
- ICT enabled advanced methods are used for teaching and learning in the College.
- The College organizes seminars, guest lectures, quiz contests, workshops.
- The departments of the College conduct unit tests, group discussions and home assignments etc.
- Field study, subject tours, Symposium, Project work and dissertation work carried out by most of the departments of the College for giving latest trends in teaching and research activities and for creating interest and enthusiasm among the students.
- Exposing students for outdoor learning through educational trips, camps etc.
- Motivating students for research activities.
- Special coaching and remedial classes for weaker students are carried out to bring up the backward students to the forefront.
- The College supplements the lecture method by other learning/teaching methods such as interactive method, demonstration method, use of charts and models, group discussions and use of computers.
- Efforts are being made to involve the students in these activities to develop the innovative thinking of the students.
- Faculty development programmes through seminars, workshops, summer schools and university/ College leadership development programmes and participation of teachers in general orientation and subject refresher courses.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

The University examinations and evaluations are managed by the University of Jammu, however, College conducts examination as per the rules and regulations of the University of Jammu. The evaluation is done at University of Jammu on Table by the university and College teachers. The university has also opened an evaluation centre in the College from the current session. Almost all the faculty members are engaged in the evaluation process.

Internal Examinations are conducted as per the instructions of the University of Jammu. The College has adopted the centralized examination system for conduct of Internal Assessments.

- (a) Teachers are kept updated about available scopes for applying for research grants.
- (b) Space and necessary infrastructural support is provided for research work.
- (c) College has a research committee for promotion of research and development.
- (d) Research Journals have also been subscribed for the teacher/researchers.
- (e) College has organised seminars, symposiums and workshops.
- (f) UGC sponsored research projects are in operation, the faculty also contributes in their respective fields through books and research papers.
- (g) Research journals have also been subscribed for the teacher/researchers.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college has adopted following Quality Improvement strategies for Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation:

LIBRARY

- Library is monitored by the Library Committee, IQAC and Administration on routine basis.
- The College Library is automated and the information regarding availability of books, issue details, etc is available to the students and staff.
- New Books has been purchased.
- More Journals/Magazines has been Subscribed on the basis of library user's feedback.
- Organised Book Exhibitions to encourage reading habits among students and other stake holders.
- Displayed new arrivals on the board.
- Extended the reprographic facilities and library hours.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The college manages human resources in the following manners:

- The human resource of the college is managed in a democratic manner.
- The college has a Student's Union whose elections are held annually.
- The Teacher's Council and the Non-Teaching Staff Association look after the affairs of the teaching and non-teaching staff respectively.
- Also, the Teachers remain available even outside the Class either in the Library or in the Staff Room for the Student counselling.
- Moreover, College has a Grievance Redressal Cell, Carrier and Counseling Cell, Suggestion Box, Placement Cell, Discipline Committee, Anti Ragging Committee, Women Development Cell, Health Centre, etc.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The permanent Faculty and all other Staff is appointed by Govt. of Jammu & Kashmir through JKPSC and JKSSRB. Moreover, contractual staff is also appointed by the Govt. of Jammu and Kashmir.

Only Local Fund Employees are appointed by the college on need basis. College has Local Fund Committee comprising of eight Senior Faculty Members which recommends for appointment of new Local Fund Employee on meritbasis . The college administration finally makes new appointment of Local Fund.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The college follows rules & regulations of affiliating University and Government of J&K in the admission process.

UG Courses:

- Admission in UG Courses is done by college.
- Admission is made strictly on the basis of merit. However, the students belonging to different reserved categories like SC, ST, ALC and RBA get additional weightage of 5% marks at the time of admission.
- The College ensures publicity to the admission process by advertising in regional news papers, prospectus, College website, local Cable TV Channels'
- Transparency is ensured in the admission process from the stage of notification till the completion of admission process.
- The Principal and Conveners of the admission committee, along with the members of the committees of various streams is part of the selection process.
- The counselling team helps the students to make the choice of the stream and subjects.
- College follows reservation policy of the government in admission also.
- The College gives prospectus at the time of admission to students from where students know the information about fees structure, student support, etc.

PG COURSES

Admission in PG Courses viz. M. Sc Chemistry and Master of Computer Applications (MCA) is done through an Entrance test conducted by the University of Jammu. However, HOD's of PG Departments attend counselling of students who qualifies for admission to MCA and M.Sc. Chemistry.

- The college has made arrangements for the parking of the vehicles of the staff and students in the college ground in a separate place. This helps in keeping the campus clean to a greater extent.
- The dead leaves and the waste papers are not allowed to be put on fire. The leaves are buried in the soil itself and the papers are disposed off.
- The College is provided with Gravity water supply scheme from a natural spring located around 3 kms away from the College. The College has got constructed storage water tanks at hostels to save wastage of water.


The Practice & the Evidence of the Success

The college did away with the age long system of working in the administrative block. The whole system was computerized. The system of the fee collection was very tedious and cumbersome. The college by computerizing the total accounts has successfully got rid of many hurdles. This has resulted in making the system smooth. The college is already facing the dearth of man power. By computerizing the system, the college has successfully overcome the shortage of the staff. Now the work has been facilitated to the extent that the staff has very deftly acquired the new system resulting in the increase in their efficiency. Similarly, the college was not able to bring out the best out of the students. The dropout rate and the failure rate was scaling heights. The college then introduced the UGC sponsored Remedial Classes. The students were given extra guidance in the subjects like English, Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics in particular. The college ensured that the students are provided with the Question Banks framed by the experienced faculty of the college. This action has resulted in a steep downfall in the failure rate. The Question Banks have facilitated the students in such a way that their efforts in the preparation of the final exams have started bearing fruits.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The college had certain problems to face in the process of administration. The account maintenance was very cumbersome to manage. The college had to face long queues of the students who assembled for fee deposit. Now the things have smoothed out. Similarly the students were facing a lot of problem in studies. The college was finding it hard to control the dropout rate and the failure. The remedial classes came as a boon for such students. The students are now finding it easy to combat the problems they were facing. The college required the infrastructure in the shape of computer systems. The Government provided the same from its resources. The staff was trained by the computer experts. The software required was purchased. The resources required for the remedial classes were granted by the UGC.
